Prom the Book of Acts that some of us are studying on Wednesday evenings, there appears this description of the early church offering a snapshot of those bucolic days when Christianity and the Church were just beginning. At this stage, the "Christian Way" was a movement; it had not yet transformed into the institution known as "the Church." From Acts 2:43-47: "Everyone around was in awe—all those wonders and signs done through the apostles! And all the believers lived in wonderful harmony, holding everything in common. They sold whatever they owned and pooled their resources so that each person's need was met. They followed a daily discipline of worship in the Temple followed by meals at home, every meal a celebration, exuberant and joyful, as they praised God. People in general liked what they saw. Every day their number grew as God added those who were saved" (from *The Message*, Eugene Peterson).

Ah yes, movements are more fun, aren't they? They are exciting, engaging, enlivening. No Committee/Board meetings. No budget to meet. Everyone on the same page and a feeling of unanimity. Did I mention no committee meetings?

Institutions, however, can be a pain. They take lots of care and feeding. They take lots of work and maintenance. If one is not careful, they can suck the life out of you, fast.

Well, can you guess what happened? Somebody in the Jesus movement figured out that they needed to set up a system whereby the faith could be passed on to future generations. Movements, you see, are short-lived and tend not to last. So they poured themselves into building the resulting institution, otherwise known as the Church. They did it not for themselves, but so that their children and grandchildren would find the same peace and joy that had originally been experienced in earlier days.

These "saints" are all those dear people who loved us, who told us stories of Jesus, who lived the faith before us and exemplified the path of discipleship. As we remember them and their efforts on All Saints Day, November 1, there comes the realization that we are not here by our own efforts. Rather, we are here in church by their gifts and grace.

It's our turn now. As the hymn says, "Pass It On." Pass on the faithfulness, love, acts of service and the amazing good unfolding week by week in our congregation. Stay positive, optimistic, and enthusiastic! And just remember this: the good work that you are doing is at least as much for future generations as it is for you.

There is a growth industry in our world that expends considerable time, money, and effort on the effort to divide. That industry has enjoyed no small amount of success. The impact of that "success" is evident whenever we check up on the news, and from time to time, when we together try to discern a way ahead.

We need to start by loving each other as fully as we are able. ,In that effort there is no place for selfishness or self-aggrandizement. None of us are perfect and all of us have gifts of the spirit to share.

As we, together, discern who and how we are going to be, we need to be mindful of our own place in things. Do we listen well to others? When we listen are we looking first to advance an agenda or are we listening to understand? Are we truly trying to be loving or is there something else going on? Have we failed to see the change in the one to whom we are listening? Is there worry there?

None of this comes easily to any of us but all of it is essential to a healthy and vibrant Church community. So too is rest, Sabbath if you will. There is danger in overdoing, perhaps more danger than in not doing enough. How so? It can be pretty easy to both take up too much space and, inadvertently, find oneself in the position of being controlling rather than empowering. It is difficult for love to grow when we get wrapped up in asserting control rather than in becoming vulnerable. Being vulnerable runs contrary to our nature for many, likely even all of us. Absent vulnerability, compassion and growth becomes problematic.

Even a quick glance at the world around us clearly demonstrates the absolute necessity of change. We are supposed to be a community embedded in the way of Jesus. The way of Jesus sets aside division and replaces it with love. Love for God and love for each other.
