# From Rev. Keith Bowie, Transitional Minister



It's hard to believe that the Lenten season has just begun as I write this message. It feels like the year is barely underway, and already it is time to consider how best to approach our time as we walk with Jesus down the path of honesty, confession, and truth-telling. I have to admit, usually my preparation revolves almost exclusively around the question: "What am I giving up this year?" It's an important practical question, surely, and I do plan to devote some discernment time to answering it. But sometimes I think I start to view Lent as little more than a period of compartmentalized self-discipline.

So, this year, in addition to the traditional sacrifices and the inner transformation of our lives, I want to invite you to join me in taking a page out of Richard J. Foster's classic book *Celebration of Discipline.* You may have heard of or even read this book as I've seen copies of it in the church library. In addition to the inward disciplines of prayer, fasting, meditation, etc., Foster writes about the outward disciplines like worship and guidance and service. Let's add community to that list.

Of course, each one of us makes an individual journey through Lenten death to Easter resurrection, but we also walk together as the Body of Christ. We participate in Christ's own life and death, part of which means helping our loved ones to carry their crosses, whether through our sacrifice and service or simply by being present to them in their need. Part of this also means accompanying each other in prayer, praying *with* as well as praying *for* one another.

Whatever form this takes in your life—making time for a struggling friend, joining a family member in a particular devotion, praying together for a shared goal—I hope you find a way to invite the gifts and graces of community into your Lent. May Christ guide our footsteps and give us good companions along the way.

When I was growing up, many of my Catholic friends would "*give up*" something for Lent. Often it was ice cream or some other sweet, as well as not eating meat on Friday. I suppose today's equivalent would be giving up internet time.

This is a list suggesting things you can "*give up*" for Lent that will help you reach new people. So here goes....

- <u>Give up</u> saying, "*Everyone I know goes to church*" (in fact, less than 20% of people go anywhere).
- <u>Give up</u> saying, "*I am too busy to pray today*" (this is how we remember who we are and Whose we are)
- <u>Give up</u> your fear of talking about your church and faith to someone you know who doesn't go to church.
- <u>Give up</u> thinking the public is unspiritual. Over 70% of all age generations are spiritual.
- <u>Give up</u> saying, "When my kids were young they always came to Sunday School, why can't parents today?" It is a far-different culture and world today with many different Sunday morning schedules and impossible choices for parents.
- <u>Give up</u> on the notion that you will "die" if you invite someone. You won't die and a friend will be so thankful you did invite them.
- <u>Give up</u> criticizing your Pastor and other lay leaders and get busy meeting someone new.

If you need to stop eating fatty foods or limit your caffeine intake as a Lenten discipline, please do so. But more importantly please "*give up*" anything that is keeping you from sharing the Good News, and helping another person experience the Risen Christ.

If Jesus had a playlist of music, surely this familiar hymn would be among the Top Five.


