once preached an Easter Sunday sermon in which I used St. Paul's words to the Corinthians as a text: "If Christ has not been raised, then our proclamation has been in vain and your faith has been in vain." (1 Corinthians 15:14). In the presentation of the sermon, I was quite forthright and unequivocal that Christianity is founded upon an astounding, unexpected, but nevertheless real event: the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead. Christians are those who see all human history in the light of this event. This is the foundational, irreducible event upon which our faith rests. We believe in the resurrection of the body. Afterwards, during coffee time, a gentleman came up to me, a little upset. He said, "You really didn't leave much room for us skeptics, did you?"

Of course, skepticism is nothing new. When the apostle Paul, on Mars Hill, preached Jesus' resurrection from the dead (Acts 17) he was greeted with hoots and jeers of derision. Even in scripture we find Jesus' own disciples having doubts. Remember Thomas? Many times, skepticism precedes belief. In C.S. Lewis' early life, accounts of Christ's death had always seemed to Lewis to be "silly or shocking." Yet a late-night conversation with a couple of his friends, one being J.R.R. Tolkien, on the grounds of Magdalen College, Oxford, helped him accept Jesus Christ as the Son of God. Tolkien encouraged Lewis to relax into Christianity as a story and accept it on its own terms. Easter is all about resurrection of the body.

Easter is not about springtime, though spring is a pretty good metaphor for what happened. It's not about Easter eggs or chocolate, even though I love chocolate! It's important to remember that neither logic, nor metaphor, nor explanation will suffice. In the end, all you have are testimonial words like these: "He is alive! I have met him. Come and see!" Those words are at the heart of the Christian faith. Do you know what my favorite part of the Easter liturgy is? It's when we say, in loud acclamation, on Easter morning:

"CHRIST IS RISEN! HE IS RISEN INDEED!"


