From Rev. Keith Bowie, Transitional Minister

The listening sessions with the list of nine questions that congregants were asked are drawing to a close. This week I have scheduled two sessions with Council members where I will fill the role of moderator or facilitator and ask the questions to them with a scribe to take notes. As with you, their comments will remain anonymous. If you recall when this process first started, the purpose of these anonymous sessions was to gather information to help understand how our church family wants to move forward. If you haven't yet participated and want to do so, if somehow you weren't contacted or your name fell through the cracks, **there is still time**. But please contact a Council member or the church office right away so a listening session can be arranged for you. After the listening sessions have been concluded, the process isn't over. The findings will have to be compiled and then be readied to share with the Council and ultimately with the congregation.

From all reports that I have heard, this has been an amazing process. The sessions have gone well thus far, and people have been appreciative of being asked to participate. Participants did not hold back with their comments—both positive and negative—and this was a good thing to have happened. This whole initiative will surely pay dividends for the church down the road.

In my mind, this all goes to show the good results that can come about when we share and when we deeply listen to one another. Do you find it interesting that the words communicate, communion, and community sound so much alike? It is really no coincidence. They come from the same root and refer to processes of coming together and exchanging and sharing in order to create commonality. I think one reason why Jesus Christ was so effective with people was because of the



singleness of the message he communicated. Because of his interior peace and simplicity, there was a harmony and unity between what he was and what he said. Everything about him communicated his authenticity.

Remember, we are still human beings just trying to stay connected to one another and sharing our existence with God and neighbor. As St. Paul admonished, let us be gentle and forgiving of one another.



The NEW BUILDING Campaign for Loaves & Fishes Food Pantry

THE MISSION

Loaves & Fishes Food Pantry feeds and serves the hungry in Hancock County, striving to eliminate food insecurity in our community. We treat all clients with respect, so that they leave the pantry with dignity and hope as well as groceries. Loaves & Fishes is committed to ensuring that anyone who needs food assistance receives it.

THE CHALLENGE

Food insecurity has risen during the pandemic and has affected many families and individuals who never thought they'd need help. Loaves & Fishes is preparing to move to a new home that will enable us to better meet the ongoing need in our community.

OUR NEW HOME

This past summer, we were fortunate enough to find a property in Ellsworth that aligns with our vision for providing more food to more hungry people. The Genesis Community Loan Fund helped us buy the building for \$550,000.

Once renovated, the centrally located, easily accessible 8,000 square foot facility will have:

- A 3,200 square foot market that will accommodate at least ten people at a time versus the current three. Clients will be welcome to come shop as often as they need to instead of once a month.
- A community garden to provide educational and experiential opportunities for families who are interested in learning how to grow their own vegetables. Our clients will be able to harvest the fresh produce as part of their shopping experience.
- Adequate room for receiving and processing food, plus on-site commercial refrigeration.
- Space for private client consultations and a conference room to share with community
 partners who serve our collective client base.

With preliminary renovations slated to start as funds are raised, it's our hope and goal to raise the required funds and open the new facility by the end of 2022.

CAMPAIGN GOAL

Our campaign goal of \$850,000 will help us:

- Serve more clients and normalize the shopping experience so families have access to nutritious food when and where they need it.
- Store everything under one roof, simplifying the logistics of keeping the pantry stocked.
- Own our "forever home," allowing for future program development and expanded community engagement.
- Retire the Genesis Community Loan Fund loan used to purchase the new building, freeing up more of our funds to directly help our clients.

PLEASE HELP US REACH OUR GOAL

We're asking you to help us realize our vision and strengthen the food safety net for Hancock County families. The More Food, More Families, More Often campaign will help Loaves & Fishes move to our new home and expand our services to clients.

BY THE NUMBERS-2021

2,850 family visits (7,115 individuals)

150 families who were first time users

\$4,000 average amount currently spent on purchased food each month (one visit per month allowed)

\$6,000 anticipated monthly cost of purchased food when the new pantry opens (multiple visits per month allowed)

\$415 average retail value of food provided per visit

More than 250,000 pounds of food distributed
