over in a matter of days or weeks. Wrong! Here we are at the six-month mark in that conflict, and it shows no signs of abating. Yet, it seems to me that many of us "over here" have lost interest in this war "over there." We have closed our eyes to this conflict in order to get on with our lives and do business as usual. Ukraine is no longer in the daily headlines unless something happens, like the capture of a nuclear reactor, that makes all of us nervous again. Partly to blame is human nature, of course. Unless we have some personal connection to either Russia or Ukraine, perhaps someone we know or someone living there, this war will be played out behind the scenes ("out of sight, out of mind," as the saying goes).

We have a vision problem. Even with our eyes wide open, there are things that we see and other things that we ignore and sweep under the rug. Once Jesus complained about people who could so easily focus upon the speck in their neighbor's eye, while completely ignoring the huge plank in their own (Luke 6:42). Another time Jesus was reprimanded by leaders of a synagogue for healing a crippled woman on the sabbath. They couldn't see the miracle occurring right in front of their eyes, since they were focused on their religious rules and regulations (Luke 13:10-17).

Growing up in South Carolina, I remember racial segregation. I can remember, as a boy, seeing rest rooms with signs reading "Whites Only." There were pockets of utter poverty including "Briar Hollow," the name of the neighborhood in my hometown where all the blacks lived, whose streets were avoided by whites. Of course, the schools and churches were segregated at that time. Integration would come a few years later. What a tragic description of the way most of us lived. Yet we were told "this is just the way things are."

We live in a world where scenes of misery are acted out safely beyond our view, but in other cases, right in front of our eyes. Then Jesus comes and renders for us a picture of the world as it should be, the world that is being remade by the hands of our Creator. What does it take for me and you to see that new world? I guess it would take someone rising from the dead to show us that which we are so determined not to see. Perhaps then we might pay attention and begin to really see. Well, someone HAS come back from the dead; someone HAS risen in order to help us see!



OIL PAINTING OF OUR STEEPLE

The church unexpectedly received a painting of our iconic and beloved steeple. This letter from Karl Schultz accompanied it:

My mother painted this in 1963-4. After her passing in 1974, my sister, Gretchen, took it and displayed it in her home until her passing late this year. Her son, Kirby, passed it on to me. But I believe it really belongs to the church. Enjoy! On the back of the painting, I have attached this document:

"This painting of the Ellsworth Congregational Church steeple was done by my mother, Julia Laurene Bovee Schultz (1907-1974). My father was Floyd Van Nest Schultz (1910-1986). They lived in West Lafayette, IN. He was a professor at Purdue University.

This was originally written on the back of the painting by my mother:

Old Congregational Church – Ellsworth, Maine. A landmark for homebound sailors. It has given more great men to the State and Nation than any other church of its size in New England. As seen on our visit in August 1963.

A church steeple represents the living church which can bring peace, quietness, and inspiration."
