From Rev. Keith Bowie, Transitional Minister

September will mark my fiftieth anniversary of ordination. It is hard to believe how quickly those years have flown by. I was newly married, had just graduated from Duke Divinity School with a Master's in Theology (one year beyond the Master of Divinity), and both Pam and I were looking for jobs. Our first "big decision" was to move to Pennsylvania to enable Pam to find a job in elementary school guidance counseling, a career field which was just in its infancy. She did find a position! This was Pam's home state and it was there that I was first introduced, luckily as it turned out, to the United Church of Christ. I did supply preaching that summer of 1973 and got to know the history and traditions of the UCC while we lived with Pam's parents.

There were far-reaching societal and cultural issues in the news that year. I remember watching with much interest the Watergate Hearings, exposing the dark side of politics on TV for all to see, leading to the resignation of President Richard Nixon ("I'm not a crook," Nixon famously said). U.S. participation in the Vietnam War came to an end. Also coming to an end, unfortunately, was the post-World War II economic boom and the beginning of the first of a series of recessions that continued over the next decade. The first oil crisis took place in 1973. Abortion was made legal (Roe v. Wade) and the first handheld cellular phone call was made. "The Godfather" won an Oscar for Best Picture and Secretariat won the Kentucky Derby. Meanwhile, Elvis Presley's concert in Hawaii was watched by more people than the Apollo Moon landings.

All those event were in the background while I was busily searching for a "call" to a church. Finally, a four-point charge opened up. Four churches—one minister! Now who in their right mind would accept such a position? Me, that's who. So I would preach at two of the churches on a given Sunday and the other two churches the next Sunday. One of the nice things about that arrangement was that I could use the same sermon for both weeks, meaning I only had to write a sermon every other week. This was fortunate for me because my sermons were terrible since I still needed to master the art and craft of preaching. I hope that I have improved since then, but you will have to be the judge of that. Unfortunately for Pam, who came to all of the services (God bless her), she had to listen (or endure?) each sermon four times! The other nice thing was we were able to live in a sizable parsonage. At that point, we had not been able to save any money for a down payment on a home, so the parsonage was a godsend. Our few belongings were able to be packed in a small U-Haul-It trailer towed behind our car. A group of men from the church were awaiting us when we arrived, a welcoming sight, to help us unload, but we were done in about 15 minutes.

My answer was "There is no point." For once, I'm not trying to moralize, sermonize, or make any kind of "point," other than thanking God for 50 years of blessed ministry! Amen. ◆



The Neighbors in Need (NIN) offering supports the UCC's ministries of justice and compassion throughout the US. Two-thirds of the offering is used by the Justice & Witness Ministries to fund local and national justice initiatives and direct service projects. Justice & Witness has strong policy advocacy on issues such as the federal budget, immigration, health care, voting rights, hate crimes, civil liberties, and environmental justice.

NIN also supports our native American neighbors. One-third of the offering supports the UCC's council for American Indian Ministries (CAIM). Historically, forebears of the UCC established churches and worked with Lakota, Dakota, Nakota, Mandan, Hidatsa, Arickara, and Hocak in North & South Dakota, Wisconsin, and northern Nebraska. Today there are 20 UCC congregations on reservations and one urban, multitribal UCC congregation in Minneapolis. CAIM supports these churches and is an invaluable resource for more than 1,000 individuals from dozens of other tribes and nations who are members of the UCC in the US.

We will receive gifts to NIN throughout September and recognize NIN in the liturgy on October 1.


