

From Rev. Keith Bowie, Transitional Minister

In these coming weeks of fall, we will be frequently hearing the word "stewardship", thanks to our dedicated stewardship committee. I don't want to steal their thunder, but I do want to offer a definition of the word "steward" and give you a concrete story about it. *Steward* comes from a Greek word meaning "manager of a household." We all know that we have to take care of our homes, or they will fall into a state of disrepair. If you happen to be a homeowner, you are (a) always cleaning something, and (b) always having to make repairs, from clogged drains to painting to installing a new water heater, etc. If you do those things, you are, by definition, a good steward. Stewards are responsible people.

Our church is no exception. We are the household of God (1 Tim. 3:15). Many of you have seen the lift out beside the church recently. The Trustees have authorized work on the steeple to repair damage in which water somehow got into the steeple and seeped down to part of the sanctuary ceiling. The steeple is in the process of being repaired now, and then the ceiling can be tackled. It all adds up to a frightful price, especially since additional damage was found, but ours is an aging building and things happen. What I want to do now is publicly commend the Trustees for their decisive and timely action. As far as I know,

Beloved Maine Conference,

As I prepare to conclude my ministry with this conference tomorrow, I feel such deep gratitude for the ways that you have welcomed me, partnered with me, challenged me, and inspired me. All over Maine I have met incredible churches, small and large, that are wrestling with how to be faithful and adaptive in a world that looks so very different than it used to. I've met congregations engaging in deeply impactful missions in their communities – from outreach to new immigrants to teen drop-in centers to food pantries and community meals. I see how hard many of you working to be the hands and feet of Christ in your community—and it matters.

It's pretty vogue these days to talk about how the days of church are done, but what I see is how very vital your offerings are to building healthy communities. It's true that the container for how we offer the gifts of God to the people of God might be shifting, but the essentials of what you are offering could not be more relevant:



- Community amidst an epidemic of loneliness
- Good News in the midst of seemingly endless bad news
- Belovedness in a culture that predicates worth on productivity and conformity
- Complexity in a world of false binaries

This is no small offering; it is life-saving stuff.

If I could offer any deep hopes for this conference, it's that you'd trust the transformative power of the Gospel so much that you would be willing to risk it all to live it out. Risk changing the traditions. Risk funding the bold vision. Risk being wrong or looking foolish or being uncomfortable.

As Jesus says in the Gospel of John, "Very truly, I tell you, unless a grain of wheat falls into the earth and dies, it remains just a single grain; but if it dies, it bears much fruit." There may be an expiration date on how we've always done things, but there is no limit on what God might resurrect once we let the old die away.

And other than God, the very thing you will need most along the way, is one another. So I pray you reach out beyond your walls to other churches and conference staff to help magnify your impact. There is a reason why we are connected by covenant to the other churches and settings in the United Church of Christ. The work is too vast to do alone; we need one another. This conference is full of wise, generous, gifted people; there's no telling what might be possible when you partner together.

So reach out to our Conference Minister, Marisa, for support and guidance. Get to know the other churches in your association and find out what kind of holy mischief you might engage in together. Explore some of the wider ministries of the United Church of Christ to see what kinds of programs or funding or initiatives might be exactly what you are hoping to tap into. The well is deep, friends. There is no need to stay parched.

Even though I will no longer be serving among you, I will continue to pray for you and root for you from afar. I believe in you—and I believe in what God is doing through you. I hope you believe, too.
