From Rev. Keith Bowie, Transitional Minister

hanks to your generosity, the Minister's Discretionary Fund of FCC continues to bring comfort and hope to people in the larger community as well as to members of the church family. Since the beginning of the year, approximately \$1,900 has been given out. Rent assistance, gas, and heating assistance are the top requests. While I receive their thanks and joy on behalf of all of us, please know YOU make a huge difference in many lives. Please remember, the MDF is not a part of the church budget. Should you be willing and able, donations made specifically to the Fund are always welcomed.

On this topic, it got me to thinking about the harsh winter we have all experienced and the extraordinary needs of a vast number of people, both locally and nationwide. In 2022, the Loaves and Fishes Food Pantry outgrew its modest building at the Unitarian Universalist Church and moved into a larger structure on the Downeast Highway Route 1. Now the Bar Harbor Food Pantry has recently announced an upcoming move from its current location at the YWCA in Bar Harbor to a larger building. Its executive director, Tom Reeve, cited a 20% surge in demand in the past month alone for the food pantry's services. "The week of April 8, we had 205 customers come to the pantry, and that matches our busiest week of 2023," said Reeve. "This past week, we ended with 256 customers. We've never seen these numbers in a week. These are numbers that we used to get in a month" (*Mount Desert Islander*, May 2). Our own Welcome Table, now 12 years old (yay!), served 110 meals on May 8. I recently received a spring appeal letter from Rosalani Moore, executive director of H.O.M.E. Inc. of Orland, in which she stated, "Homelessness is increasing in our area."

You don't have to be Euclid to figure out the whys of all this increased demand for services. The main culprit, of course, is inflation. Despite all the happy talk to the contrary, food prices increased by more than 15% over 2022 and 2023. Costs are expected to continue rising throughout 2024. One year ago, COVID relief funds got cut off. I'm also sensing a growing dependency culture and a broken "open borders" immigration system as reasons for the surge.

In light of this, what is the church to do? Throw up our hands and surrender in despair? In a word, No! Let us continue practicing "mercy." Did you know "mercy" appears 457 times in the Old and New Testament? In order to obtain mercy, we are called to be merciful. Mercy is one of the Beatitudes: "Blessed are the merciful, for they shall obtain mercy." But what exactly does it mean to be merciful, to show mercy? *Misericordia* is the Latin word for mercy, meaning "to feel pity in our hearts." So seeing someone suffer should cause a feeling of pity or pain in our hearts.

In his book *Heaven in Our Hands*, Father Benedict J. Groeschel writes: "I suspect that a great many people would like to be merciful but are unsure of how to begin and are afraid of being cheated. My advice is: take stock of your limited resources—time, money, mercy—and decide what to do with them. Then just try it! And if you're afraid of being cheated, cheer up. You've already been cheated by lots of people besides the poor. Mercy calls us to a better life, to a way of living which is more real, more generous, more gentle, and more spiritual than we have ever known."


