I will extol you, O Lord, for you have drawn me up, And did not let my foes rejoice over me. O Lord my God, I cried to you for help, and you have healed me. O Lord, you brought up my soul from Sheol, Restored me to life from among those gone down to the Pit.

Sing praises to the Lord, O you his faithful ones, and give thanks to his holy name. For his anger is but for a moment; his favor is for a lifetime.

Weeping may linger for the night, but **joy** comes with the morning. - Psalm 30: 1-5

In this beautiful Psalm, the psalmist is thankful after recovering from an illness. We are not told what the illness is. However, the choice of words that the psalmist uses seem to indicate that it was a serious and grave illness, one that could have led to an imminent death. The person attributes his healing and restoration to God, and now pauses to give thanks. The psalmist is in a state of utter joy and bliss, probably involving family and friends celebrating his reintegration into the community.

I want to preface this and say I do not think we have veered, but I put this in to remind us to think of some of the reasons that we attend this church and are part of this wonderful congregation. Let's step forward and invite someone to church. – K. Schrader)

Andy Stanley recently said in a sermon: "When the church veered, things got weird". His point was that when the church strays from its central mission, weird things happen, and people get hurt.

There are far too many examples of this in Christian history with all sorts of horrible things done in the name of Jesus. But what about us today? Are we being good stewards of the faith in our generation?

Jesus was very clear that our primary mission is to love one another as God loves us. If we live this mission out well, we could assume that people would respond to such grace and love and that the Church would have a huge impact on the communities where they are located. But a recent Pew Research Survey indicates that "80% of Americans feel the church is losing influence".

So, there is a disconnect. Too many people either don't know anything about the church, because we have hunkered down inside our buildings, or they have been hurt by churches judging and excluding them. Either way, what should be Good News becomes bad news for much of the population.

How do we change that perception? It changes when we in the church "walk the talk" and people see what Jesus is like through us. So, this means our task is to equip every member to be a walking example of faith with everyone they meet. It means as church leaders, that we plan activities and mission efforts that connect us with people and make a difference in the world. Authenticity is what will change the perception of people who are far from the faith or have been badly bruised by the church.

MEMBER HIGHLIGHT




Joyce Johnston

Joyce Johnston is one of those members that everyone knows, and she feels that she has been around forever. She remembers the Ellsworth Fire that destroyed most of the community. Her family lost their home and her father's business. (Her 94th birthday was Sunday, June 23rd.)

She said that she has been going to this church since age 3, attending weekly as a child. Her whole family went every week, saying that they were not forced but that was just what you did on Sunday. There were not as many churches in Ellsworth at that time, maybe 4-6, and they were all good-sized. She started Sunday School when she was 5 years old and joined the church around age 14 or 15. She fondly remembers the many church picnics at the Haynes' summer cottage down on the saltwater beach.

She has always attended this church except for the six years that she lived in Massachusetts to follow her husband's teaching job. She married in 1949 and had four children baptized in this church. She was a stay-at-home mother, but when her children were all in school, she started working for the family businesses, Merrill's Orchards and Merrill's Blueberries, in the offices. She has always been in church choirs throughout her life, singing for an incredible seventy years! She has been a member of almost every board or committee over the years and loved it all. Joyce and Becky Houston started the Evening Circle group for women who worked day jobs.

When asked about why she kept coming, she said "It always felt right, I feel close to God, and I feel at home."



"If not us, then who? If not now, then when?"

The questions of John Lewis—activist, legislator, and justice advocate—echoed in the art of Dr. Deborah Rundlett.

She knew the heartfelt hopes and challenges of youth in her community. Youth wonder about what their world will look like. Despite these challenges, teens and young adults demonstrated a commitment to social change, contributing energy and passion. Rev. Rundlett sought ways to help "unleash the potential and intrinsic power of area high school students to fulfill their capacity as current and future leaders and world citizens."

With funding from the Strengthen the Church Offering and the State of Connecticut, Dr. Rundlett and The Meetinghouse are gathering high school students to "meet with leading social entrepreneurs, environmental designers, and social justice advocates to learn how to draw from respected leadership models and learn how to move intentional change in their contexts." Students decide on a pivotal social issue and then create initiatives to address change.



A NOTE AND WARNING FROM PASTOR KEITH

Recently the *Ellsworth American* reported in its "Cops and Courts" section about a Hancock man being scammed out of a sizable amount of money. Yesterday I received an email from Pastor Jon Vogel at St. Andrew Lutheran Church in Ellsworth. He had been notified by one of his members that the member had received a text message in Pastor Jon's name asking to "return my text when you get it. I have a favor to ask of you." It closed with "Grace and peace, Pastor Jonathan Vogel." Fortunately, the member did not respond and instead alerted the church office.

This is to remind everyone that scammers are alive and well and their diabolical work continues. Church members are often targets. Please be vigilant! Please know that Pastor Keith would never send out an email, text, phone call, or letter asking for "a favor," or money or securities or anything of that nature. Of course, the Stewardship Committee has a Fall Campaign in which we seek to raise funds for the upcoming year. But that is something legitimate and entirely different from the scam artist. So, please stay alert and if anything looks suspicious to you, check it out thoroughly first.
