## From Rev. Keith Bowie, Transitional Minister

hat in the world is going on with our young and young adult people in the U.S.? On December 4, twenty-six-year-old Luigi Mangione allegedly fired a fatal shot into the back of Brian Thompson, CEO of the health insurance giant United Healthcare, as Thompson was exiting a hotel in midtown Manhattan. After Thompson was down, Mangione fired at least one more shot into his inert body. Investigators believe the motive behind the shooting was animosity toward the health care industry. What has ensued since then has been a shocking outpouring of public sympathy, especially among young people, for Mangione, not for the assassinated father who is survived by a wife and two sons! More chilling was the Emerson College poll released on December 18 indicating that 41% of voters from ages eighteen to twenty-nine believe that the Thompson killing was anywhere from "somewhat" to "completely acceptable." I beg to differ. Mr. Mangione is not a hero, but a killer who should not be glamorized. Ironically, Mr. Thompson was said to be working on health care reform before he was gunned down.

In my opinion, if you want a hero, look no further then twenty-six-year-old Daniel Penny, a former Marine who was found not guilty on December 9 in the chokehold death of Jordan Neely, a thirty-year-old homeless man with a history of mental illness, who was terrorizing a group of subway passengers in New York. Mr. Penny acted bravely to protect fellow passengers. This case also garnered national attention.

Then there was fifteen-year-old female shooter Natalie Rupnow, who opened fire on December 16 inside a private Christian school in Madison, Wisconsin, killing a teacher and a teen student and injuring six others. Police said Rupnow died of a self-inflicted gunshot wound. In another case earlier in the year, girls only thirteen and fourteen years old in Washington, DC, were convicted in the beating death of an elderly disabled man. They said in one report that they were "bored."

Something has profoundly changed for America's youth. What is driving all this? Broken families? Fatherless homes? Guns? Drugs? Young people getting radicalized on-line? Is this, in turn, causing loneliness and depression? Does that lead to rage? How about the constant bombardment of violent images on screens big and small which desensitizes us? Lack of faith and declining church attendance? We need a religious reawakening in the land! At least one person, Cardinal Timothy Dolan of New York City, believes one is coming, that people seem increasingly drawn to finding the light. "There seems to be a newfound appreciation for the role of faith, especially in our country," he says. Let's hope he is right.

From Rev. Paul Nickerson's weekly newsletter:

#### "Why Don't People Come to Church?"

I so often hear good church people ask, with bewilderment, sadness and confusion: "Why don't people come to church anymore? It feels like the practices we enjoy as church members are not valued by the wider community.

Part of the explanation is that we live in a "different age" today. In the book, **Leading Faithful Innovation**, the authors describe it this way:

Many of us in the church grew up in the "Age of Association". We joined organizations like the church and found our meaning by serving those institutions. My parents lived in the same town for 52 years, and at that time they served on every church board (often several times) and many organizations in the town. They found deep purpose and meaning by serving and maintaining these organizations. This is still very fulfilling for many of our members.

But today we live in an "Age of Authenticity" in which people look inward to find their identities and purpose; how to express their true self. This journey does not necessarily involve an institution. People still have spiritual and life questions, but don't find their meaning serving on boards and committees.

Growing churches have to live in both "ages". They need to continue to nurture those who find meaning in serving institutions, while at the same time showing how the Gospel can answer many of the questions raised in a journey for authenticity.

Just as the Apostle Paul went beyond the synagogues to dialogue with people of faith (see the encounter with Lydia in Acts 16), today we need venture out and start conversations with people right where they live. This approach won't fill out committees, but it will help others find and follow Jesus. ◆
