mericans have a love affair with camps and camping. It rises to the level of a spiritual, sacred rite. According to the American Camp Association, more than 20 million children attend each summer. It's a ritual of personal growth, community building, and of communing with nature. Those camps that are Christian in orientation, like Pilgrim Lodge of the Maine Conference UCC, offer added value - an opportunity to worship, pray, and commune with God, our Creator.

Camping has been a big part of my life. I attended a church camp for boys as a youngster in the 1950s (girls had their own camp). I fondly remember one of the requirements was having to write a postcard to your parents after a day or two at camp letting them know how camp was going. This had the dual purpose of letting one's parents know that you were safe (and good public relations for the camp!), as well as helping one to conquer any homesickness from being away from home for the very first time.

I enjoyed camp so much that I served for three summers on the staff of a Baptist boys camp in South Carolina during my high school and college years. I was a counselor-in-training the first summer, a lifeguard/cabin counselor the second, and the third summer I was the waterfront director on a beautiful lake, supervising two other lifeguards. I also taught swimming lessons to those who wished to learn how to swim. All of us had our Senior Lifesaving certification through the American Red Cross. It was at Camp McCall (the name of the camp) that I first felt the stirring and nudging of the Holy Spirit to become a minister.

After becoming an ordained minister in Penn Southeast Conference of the UCC, the Conference camping staff was looking for some volunteers to take a group of 25 -30 middle and senior highs to—you guessed it!—Maine to pilot a new mode of camping experience. This



happened in July of 1974. My wife Pam and I volunteered, along with six others, two of whom served as bus drivers/counselors. The first week was spent at Pilgrim Lodge on beautiful Lake Cobbosseecontee. For the second week we traveled to coastal Maine, splitting our time between Camden Hills State Park and the Blackwoods Campground in Acadia National Park. Of course, Pam and I were smitten by the natural beauty of this state. Do you think that this camping experience played a role in our move to Maine years later? God, it seems, does work in mysterious ways!

From Rev. Paul Nickerson's weekly newsletter:

The Importance of What We Measure

When we look at how we are doing as a church, we usually turn to some common measurements: worship attendance, budget, number of people in small groups, etc. And while this information can be somewhat important in understanding our church health, there are some more vital metrics that we should consider.

When I ask a church how important it is to grow disciples, everyone says that is central to ministry. Yet when I ask, "Well, how are you doing with discipleship"? I get little or very vague responses. Wouldn't measuring our central purpose, discipleship, be important?

Rather than just looking at worship numbers and dollars, could we begin to measure how many people in our congregation are living like Christ during the week?

What might that look like? Church Consultant, Will Mancini, suggests that each church develop a measurable list of Christlikeness for their congregation. This could include:

- Faith, hope and love from I Cor 13:13
- Fruits of the Spirit (Gal 5: 22-23)
- The Beatitudes of Matthew 5: 3-10

We could begin to ask members about their living out of the faith and tell stories of how people are offering help, compassion and prayer to those

around them. We could begin to catalogue what percentage of our members leave worship on Sunday and do something in their neighborhood, workplace or school that reflects the Spirit of Christ. The results would help us understand what needs to happen in worship, programs and mission efforts to help every member become a deeper follower of Jesus.

Numbers in worship and dollars in budget will indicate participation (which every church needs to know) but analyzing how we are actually making disciples who go out into the world and live like Christ is by far the more important measure of our central purpose. •



The 1989 New Revised Standard Version (NRSV) of the Bible in our church pew racks is no longer in print. It has been replaced by the New Revised Standard Version: Updated Edition (NRSVue). The NRSVue is a result of rigorous biblical scholarship, aiming to provide readers with the most inclusive, informed, and reliable text available, incorporating new manuscript discoveries since the 1989 introduction of the original NRSV.

Since June 30, 2025, the NRSV is no longer available online for the church secretary to easily cut and paste scripture readings for the liturgists' ease. With long passages, our secretary, Joyce, worries about introducing errors if she types them out from the pew Bible. In recent weeks you may have noticed that the readings from the pulpit don't quite match what you are reading. Perhaps this bothers you, perhaps it does not.

Joyce needs to know if it is okay for our liturgists to read scripture from the NRSVue which does not exactly match what you read in the pew Bible.

RESULTS OF OPEN AND AFFIRMING (ONA) SURVEY

The Open and Affirming (ONA) Committee is sharing the following results of the ONA survey that was taken in May 2025. Based on the responses, we have determined that our congregation is not ready to bring the subject to a vote at this time. The committee intends to continue serving as a resource in helping our members explore and learn about ONA, although in a less structured way. We urge everyone to keep the conversation going with each other and with members of the committee: John Lacey, Steve Merchant, Mary Turner, Myrna Vallette and Chris Wilson.



Highlights

- Forty (40) percent of the membership responded to the survey (28 out of 70 members); two non-members also submitted surveys)
- Items #2 and #3 of the survey were similar, but were worded differently. For #2, 16 said they "need to know <u>more</u> about why some people think an ONA designation matters..." and 14 said no. Yet for #3, 27 said they "have learned enough about what Open and Affirming is..."
- The response to #4, "I feel it is important for our congregation to be formally and publicly designated as ONA," was evenly split with 13 yes and 13 no (four people left it blank).
- 17 marked that, yes, the congregation is already welcoming, and we don't need to be designated ONA; eight said no, and five did not answer.
- 13 feel we are ready to put the ONA question to a vote, six said no, and 11 did not answer or are unsure.
- Asked if there was a vote today, 16 said they would vote to be ONA, 12 said no, and two did not answer.

Detailed Survey Results

- 1. I am a member of FCC: Yes: 28 No: 2
- 2. I need to know more about why some people think an ONA designation matters, and how ONA affects our church: **Yes**: 16 **No**: 14
- 3. I have learned enough about what Open and Affirming is, and what it would mean for our church: **Yes**: 27 **No**: 2 **Blank**: 1
- 4. I feel it is important for our congregation to be formally and publicly designated as ONA: **Yes**: 13 **No**: 13 **No** answer: 4
- 5. I think our congregation is already welcoming, and we don't need to be designated ONA: **Yes**: 17 **No**: 8 **No answer**: 5
- 6. A vote by a majority of members would be required to designate FCC as ONA. Do you feel that we are ready to put this to a vote? **Yes**: 13 **No**: 6 **No answer/blank**: 11
- 7. If we were to put the ONA designation to a vote today, how would you vote? **Yes, become ONA**: 16 **No, do not become ONA**: 12 **Blank**: 2
