From Rev. Keith Bowie, Transitional Minister

Recently I presented a children's message in worship using Hebrews 12:1-2 as a text: "...let us run with perseverance the race that is set before us, looking to Jesus the pioneer and perfecter of our faith..." Sounds very basic, simple, and foundational, doesn't it? Keeping our eyes fixed and focused upon Jesus. I mean, come on, who can argue with that as a guiding principle of the church? Don't we arise each Sunday, dress, and travel to church in all kinds of weather to worship Jesus, the Christ? Why else would we go to such lengths to be here? "Consider him who endured such hostility against himself, so that you may not grow weary or lose heart (12:3)." Pretty simple stuff to understand, right? It all sounds so, well, Sunday School-ish. However, sometimes the simple eludes us. For whatever reason, we complicate things when we set aside the obvious. But it would be a huge mistake for us to dismiss this spiritual wisdom that says to keep our eyes focused upon Jesus.

I was reading yet another article on the death of the mainline Protestant church (or, as it now prefers to be called, "progressive") by Carl R. Trueman in *First Things* in which he stated that "mainline Protestantism lost interest in the transcendent truths of Christianity and married the spirit of the age generations ago." The problem, he says, is "its failure to grasp the church's vision and mission. That vision must focus on the church's countercultural, supernatural message of redemption through the life, death, and resurrection of the incarnate Christ." It seems to me that Trueman is saying the same thing as the author to the Letter to the Hebrews. Same horse, different jockey. In plain English, we got distracted and took our eyes off the ball, that is, Jesus. We thus became irrelevant to legions of people, particularly young adults upon whom the church has no claim and little if any influence. I mean, if the church's message is no different than that of a political party or local Rotary Club, why bother to come?

There is a lesson here, not just for First Congregational, but for all churches. In times such as these, when the rhetoric of public discourse is so extreme, there is a real temptation to lose sight of the mission of the church. The church's message and vision are distinctive. Resist the urge to conform or capitulate to the latest cultural fad. Push back on a theology diluted by identity politics. Instead, focus, focus, focus. Keep your eyes fixed upon Jesus. Everything else that we fret about—attendance, giving, programming, outreach and mission—will fall into place. May it be so.

How to Respond: Latter-Day Saints

Revised edition by Edgar P. Kaiser

The author of this short book (61 pages) was a Lutheran minister who spent a lot of time studying Mormon religion. Along with a brief history of the denomination, Kaiser wants the reader to understand how they differ from other Christians.

Kaiser cites Mormon writings and the Holy Bible. He states facts about Mormonism and then compares and contrasts them to the Christian point of view of the Holy Bible.

This booklet is a good starting point if you want to understand Mormon doctrine compared to Christianity. This book is in our church library.

NOTE: This is the same day as the Busy Bodies' Christmas Fair.






DEDHAM CONGREGATIONAL CHURCH BAKED BEAN SUPPERS
